This year, Scout, a Chicago interior furnishings store, and technology blog Gizmodo have teamed up to create a completely new look for the home that combines uniquely repurposed pieces with the newest, most innovative technologies -- one of Brentano's polyurethane faux leathers a standout among them.

Brentano's pattern **Caress** covers a reclaimed Knoll sofa in the most prominent position on the first level of the 2011 *Smart Home*. Scout's owner Larry Vodak chose **Caress** for the way its substantial, supple construction emulates the hand and weight of real leather. With outstanding abrasion resistance and almost 250 lbs breaking strength, Caress can also handle the traffic of an exhibit that has hosted over 300,000 visitors. Caress carries the Brentano Green fabric label in line with MSI's goal for the *Smart Home* to introduce "the ways, big and small, to make eco-friendly living a part of everyday life."

About the Smart House:

The fully-functioning modular Smart Home -- conceived by the Museum of Science and Industry, designed by architect Michelle Kaufmann Designs™ and built by All American Homes® of Decatur, Ind. -- was opened to the public in May 2008 and due to its popularity has been redesigned each year. It was given the designation "Chicago's Greenest Home" after a comprehensive review of the home's plans, materials and design by the City of Chicago's Chicago Green Homes Program. Since its opening, the Museum has welcomed more than 250,000 guests on 30-minute guided tours that showcase the ways, big and small, that people can make eco-friendly living a part of their lives. Some of the green features that remain year to year include rooftop solar film, a 45-foot wind turbine, green-roof gardens and an interior that has been designed to maximize light and space.
